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### COURSE DESCRIPTION

This is a course on Bayesian theory and methods. It is an overview of Bayesian statistics, starting with a discussion of why one would use Bayesian methods. The course includes theory and applications, and is meant for a person with some theoretical statistics background.

Course topics include foundational issues -- the likelihood principle and the Bayesian approach, conjugate priors and non-informative priors, Bayesian estimation, Bayesian testing of hypotheses and the Bayes factor, robustness of Bayesian analyses, and computational issues.
